WHAT'S NEW AT THE SCHUMANN-HAUS LEIPZIG



Questioning Equality in the Arts via

Augmented Reality-App



Taking the challenges facing Clara and Robert Schumann as their point of departure, artists reflect their lives today, amidst the triangulation of careers, families and gender roles. The museum curator Prof. Dr. Beatrix Borchard interviewed violinist Carolin Widmann, pianist Lauma Skride, cellist Peter Bruns, the singersongwriters Laura Liebeskind and Wencke Wollny (Karl die Große) and the artist couple Ellen Stein and Jan Gabbert (buchstabenschubser). Equipped with one of the museum's own iPads, the visit gains a virtual level. The app will also be provided to schools throughout Germany, to be used flexibly in the classroom.

Augmented Reality creates a new level of perception, enabling the viewer to juxtapose challenges during the times of Clara and Robert Schumann with experiences and views of artists living today. To this end, visitors to the museum – resp. students during their lessons – can project those interviewed directly into the Schumann-Saal or their classroom. The app is also available free of charge in the App Store for your own iPad at home.

The project "Equality in the Arts" was developed as part of "dive in. Programme for Digital Interaction" of the Federal Foundation for Culture, supported by the Federal Government Commissioner of Culture and Media (BKM) via the programme NEUSTART KULTUR. Additional funding for the app was provided by the Mariann Steegmann Foundation.

Soundwalk through Leipzig

What's the sound of Leipzig, city of music? Find out using your smartphone and Leipzig's new "Notenspuren" app, offering numerous musical walks within the historical city centre. Some locations which no longer exist in their original form are evoked via GPS-based sound-clouds – filled with music and spoken words.

The CLARO Soundwalk was the first of these: via 6 stations, visitors can wander the historical centre, following the Schumanns' footsteps. Locations no longer existent are brought back to life, for example Clara's birthplace, the apartment where the Wieck family lived and Robert moved
